Site Investigation In groups we investigated key principles to understand the strengths, weaknesses and threats to Springvale's revitalisation.



3 Design Workshop In groups of four, the 8 key principles were explored further through a seies of questions to target the top issues and ideas from the community to be included in the SRAP.



#### My idea is...

Through the workshop process, participants shared their top ideas for Springvale.

### My top idea is...

- Making it safer for women to work in Springvale
- To engage youth through dance. Kpop!
- To create a WOW factor, when people drive into Springvale from any side
- Engaging with other cultures in the area.
   Engage with people aged 15-25
- Turn Buckingham Avenue to a pedestrian zone - Arcade nightmarkets (contractible roof). More car parks. Food and culture festivals. More toilets. Make safe place.
- Boulevard needs more lighting and decoration. Neon lights bring more people into activity centre.
- Provide parking on the outskirts, cyclos to bring people in/out to high volume areas.
   Noodle markets
- Springvale Station as centre, so spread to the other side as well.
- Senior safe sites. Shade, seating and exercise stations.

#### **Key Principles and Ideas**

During the work participants were invited to draw and annotate large maps that explored the 8 key preinciples with personal experiences and ideas. key points identified by each group are as follows.

#### Sustainability

Is waste a problem in Springvale? How could Springvale improve its waste systems to become more sustainable?

- Small steps to reach the big picture
- Bins missing where they need to be
- Place dump masters in places where people congregate
- Initiatives to recycle + manage waste- make it sexy
- Come up with innovative models that leverage our diversity.

Are there issues when it rains in Springvale? Do the drains work well?

- Bad smells in drains, rotten fruit, and oil in the drains
- Smell is off-putting
- Cultural recycling is not a thing
- Market smells are important to the area
- Too clean could lose identity- important to maintain part of its charm

How can businesses be supported to become more sustainable?

- Buckingham Avenue, buy to open it up
- Trading schemes- credits to encourage sustainable practice
- Waste schemes
- Solar power- microgrid connection to customers

#### Walkability

Where do people walk from/to? Which areas get very busy in Springvale? Which roads are difficult to cross??

- The pedestrian crossing adjacent to Osborne Avenue is unsafe, it does not provide safety for pedestrians to cross.
- Springvale Activity Centre, as there is a lack of signage or available public carparks.
- Erickson Gardens to Springvale Centre was highlighted as an unsafe walk particularly for the elderly making their way over from the south.
- The route and walking path between the Post Office and Buckingham Avenue should be addressed, as it is quite difficult to get from A to B, due to clutter, suggestion of a mass clean up or protocols.

How could we improve Springvale for pedestrians? (Footpath treatments, widening, way find etc)

- Wayfinding to show how many minutes' walk it is to the Community hub
- Addressing the rear facing shop frontage particularly along Queens Avenue, making it unpleasant to walk.
- The lack of inclusive public seating in the centre demotivates walking as the tree canopy doesn't provide shade, the restaurants have umbrellas but there should be more made on top of benches.
- Highlighting the enterprise trail that already exists.

How could we manage car parking better to make more space for pedestrians?

- Connecting carparks through a clear walking trail
- Addressing anti-social behavior and homelessness that is present in many areas around the centre, particularly the Woolworths Carpark, near the Springvale Station and laneways behind Multicultural place.
- Turning Buckingham Avenue into a left turn only road

#### What is unique about Springvale?

- Asian and Vietnamese Specialty: Springvale is known for its Asian and Vietnamese food, restaurants, groceries, and markets. It offers a wide variety of authentic and affordable options.
- Cultural Diversity: Springvale is a melting pot of cultures, with diverse multicultural communities residing and interacting in the area. It provides a sense of acceptance and comfort for people from different backgrounds.
- Vibrant Atmosphere: Springvale has a lively and active urban space, with festivals, bustling streets, and a vibrant streetscape. It offers a unique and authentic Asian city feel.
- Convenient Location: Springvale's geographical location makes it easily accessible and well-connected, with excellent train and bus routes. It is also situated midway between Mornington and the CBD, acting as a gateway to the beach and connecting different areas.
- Unique Shopping Experience: Springvale is known for its diverse range of shops and stores, offering individual and unique products. It is not dominated by franchise chains, and there is a strong emphasis on authentic Asian goods.
- Strong Vietnamese Influence: Springvale has a significant Vietnamese population and is considered the heart of the Vietnamese community in Melbourne. It offers a true reflection of Vietnamese culture and traditions.
- Food Hub and Market Town: Springvale is not only a food hub with a wide range of restaurants but also a market town with affordable shopping options. It provides a unique combination of shopping and eating out experiences.
- Community and Festivals: Springvale has a strong sense
  of community, with people of different ages and cultures
  coming together. Festivals and cultural events play a vital
  role in showcasing the diverse cultures and fostering a
  sense of harmony.

# What gets in the way of (or stops) Springvale being its best?

- Safety and Security: There are concerns about the presence of drug-involved individuals, drug paraphernalia (needles and syringes), and homeless people in the area. Residents feel unsafe and worry about the impact on their personal security.
- Homelessness and Beggars: Many respondents express concerns about the increasing number of homeless people and beggars in Springvale. They fear that this could negatively affect the reputation of the suburb and impact local businesses.

- Cleanliness and Litter: The cleanliness of the streets, shopping centers, and public facilities is a recurring issue. Some respondents mention excessive litter, dirty alleyways, and under-maintained public toilets as areas that need improvement.
- Traffic Congestion and Parking: Traffic congestion and limited parking options are highlighted as significant challenges. Insufficient parking spaces, difficulties finding parking, and congestion on certain streets, such as Buckingham Avenue, cause frustration among residents and visitors.
- Lack of Development and Modernization: Several respondents mention the outdated infrastructure, buildings, and lack of development in Springvale. They believe that improvements are necessary to make the suburb more appealing and competitive.
- Lack of Cultural Variety: Some respondents express a desire for a greater variety of businesses, including multicultural restaurants and high-quality outlets. They feel that the current concentration of certain types of shops does not provide enough diversity.
- Poor Signage and Wayfinding: The absence of clear signage and a lack of information for visitors, such as maps or historical explanations, make it difficult for newcomers to navigate Springvale. This leads to a lack of awareness about the area's cultural significance and can negatively impact the visitor experience.
- Limited Nightlife and Recreational Opportunities: There
  are calls for more nighttime activities and recreational
  spaces within Springvale. Some respondents feel that
  there are not enough options for entertainment and that
  more facilities for leisure and relaxation are needed.
- Ethnic Tensions and Cultural Recognition: A few respondents mention tensions related to multiculturalism and the perception that certain cultures dominate the area. They express a desire for greater recognition of diverse cultures and a more inclusive environment.
- Miscellaneous Concerns: Other concerns raised include the presence of smokers, inadequate public transport accessibility, the behavior of some shop owners, the condition of footpaths, and the need for more seating areas

# Which areas in Springvale could be improved for safety or accessibility?

- Parking Area around 8 Balmoral Avenue: The area is reported to be dirty, and there are concerns about homeless people hanging around.
- In front of Woolworths: It is mentioned that there are always a lot of beggars in this area.
- Lighting in Springvale Central: Suggestions were made to install more lights, both normal and solar-powered, especially near the station and areas with high pedestrian traffic at night.
- Surveillance Cameras: People suggested the need for more cameras in the streets to ensure safety.
- Springvale Shopping Centre: Requests were made for cleaner and more modern bathrooms throughout the shopping center.
- General Improvements: Many respondents mentioned that various areas in Springvale, including roads, buildings, shops, pedestrian crossings, walk paths, disability access, and children's play areas, need improvement.
- Increase in Homeless Population: Some respondents mentioned the increase in homeless people and the issue of nitric oxide containers being left in public areas.
- Safety and Accessibility at Springvale Road: Concerns were raised about safety when walking from the station to the main shops and banks on Springvale Road. The roundabout on Buckingham Avenue was also considered a nuisance.
- Traffic Congestion: Suggestions were made to assess and resolve traffic congestion issues, especially in the central Springvale area on Saturdays and public holidays.
- Springvale Station: Concerns were raised about the lighting, parking, and public toilets at the train station.
- Buckingham Avenue: Some respondents suggested making it a foot-only access area and addressing the issue of double parking.
- Springvale Market: Requests were made to improve parking facilities and update the market building.
- Virginia Street and Surrounding Areas: Complaints were made about litter, syringes, and dumping of rubbish in alleyways and residential areas.
- Safety in Public Spaces: Suggestions included the presence of police or security guards, increased lighting, CCTV cameras, and the need for footpaths to be more accessible and safe.
- Road Safety: Concerns were raised about pedestrian crossings, road speed, and the need for traffic lights at certain locations.

- Cleanliness and Maintenance: Requests were made to improve cleanliness, maintenance, and repair work in various areas, including public spaces, footpaths, and the Springvale station.
- Parking Issues: Complaints included illegal parking, lack of parking spaces, and misuse of disabled parking spots.
- Accessibility for People with Disabilities: Suggestions were made to improve accessibility by providing more disabled parking spaces, flat slant walkways instead of stairs, and installing ramps.
- Improvement of Public Toilets: Requests were made for cleaner and more accessible public toilets, as well as the addition of shelter and seating.
- Multi-Level Car Park: Some respondents mentioned the need for a multi-level car park in Springvale.
- Community Building: The Springvale Learning and Activities Centre was mentioned as needing repairs, gardening work, and renovation.
- General Cleanliness: Complaints were made about litter, rubbish, and unclean public spaces in Springvale..

### How can Springvale become more sustainable?

Waste Management and Recycling:

- Increase the number of recycling bins and educate residents on proper recycling practices.

# How could Springvale become more activated both day and night?

- Extended Opening Hours: Many respondents suggested that more shops and restaurants should stay open late at night to create a vibrant atmosphere and encourage people to visit Springvale during evening hours.
- Safety and Security: Improving safety measures was a common concern. Suggestions included increasing police presence, better lighting in public areas, addressing drug issues, and addressing the presence of homeless individuals.
- Events and Entertainment: People recommended organizing more events, such as night markets, food festivals, live music performances, outdoor movie screenings, and cultural celebrations, to attract visitors and activate the area.
- Infrastructure and Streetscape Improvements: Enhancing the physical environment was mentioned frequently. This includes creating walkable spaces, upgrading parks and children's playgrounds, improving footpaths and accessibility, installing better street lighting, and revitalizing the appearance of Springvale Road with decorations and neon lights.

- Parking and Transportation: Many respondents highlighted the need for better parking facilities and public transport options to accommodate visitors and improve accessibility to Springvale.
- Promotion and Marketing: Encouraging businesses to promote themselves, providing vouchers or incentives for customers, and increasing awareness of Springvale's offerings were suggested to attract more people to the area.
- Community Engagement: Suggestions included fostering a sense of community by providing spaces for social activities, such as outdoor seating, street-side vendors, and public gathering areas. Supporting local businesses and involving residents in decision-making processes were also mentioned.
- Cultural and Multicultural Focus: Some respondents emphasized the importance of preserving and celebrating Springvale's multicultural identity through cultural events, authentic Asian restaurants, and street food stalls.
- Cleanliness and Maintenance: Concerns were raised about cleanliness, maintenance of public spaces, and the need to address issues like unleashed dogs and proper waste management.
- Other Suggestions: Miscellaneous suggestions included creating a night market, introducing late-night shopping, improving public toilets, and providing better amenities for visitors.

# What events could be held in Springvale in the future and where?

- Cultural events: Many respondents suggested organizing cultural events such as festivals, parades, and celebrations to promote cultural awareness and bring communities together. Specific examples mentioned include Lunar New Year, Chinese New Year, Cambodian New Year, Harmony Day, Ramadan/Eid gatherings, and cultural fashion parades.
- Food festivals: There was a strong desire for food-related events, including food festivals, night markets, street food markets, food tours, and multicultural food festivals. Respondents mentioned various cuisines such as Chinese, Vietnamese, Cambodian, Thai, Korean, and Japanese.
- Craft and art events: Crafting events and arts festivals were suggested, particularly those that involve children. Locations mentioned include the library and Springvale Central.
- Community hub events: Several respondents suggested hosting events in the Springvale Community Hub precinct or extending the existing festivals to the hub area. This would provide a larger space and more grassy areas for people to enjoy.
- Music and entertainment: Music festivals, live concerts, outdoor movies, and performances were mentioned as desirable events. Some respondents also suggested featuring local talent and engaging with Monash University for event collaborations.
- Market events: Night markets, street vendors, farmer markets, and market resale events were suggested to create a vibrant atmosphere and provide business opportunities. The focus could be on selling various goods, including old/loved items.
- Children and family activities: Suggestions included kids' arts and crafts stalls during school holidays, special events for families, and family-friendly activities. The St. Joseph's playground was mentioned as a potential location.
- Sporting and recreational events: Sports-related events, such as car meets, table tennis demonstrations, bodybuilding shows, and communal seating for craft markets, were proposed. Engaging the local community in activities they already participate in was seen as important.
- Communication and information: Respondents expressed the need for more effective communication regarding events, including having schedules or posters with event details placed around Springvale.

# What places or spaces are missing from Springvale?

- Park: Many respondents mentioned the need for more parks and green spaces.

- Public outdoor seating area: People desired protected outdoor seating areas where they can sit and relax, even during rainy weather.
- Sushi store: Some mentioned the desire for a sushi store like Omi that is affordable and attracts students.
- Public area showcasing history: There was a suggestion for a public area that showcases the history of Springvale, attracting families and younger people.
- Cinemas and nightlife: Several respondents mentioned the absence of cinemas, theaters, and vibrant nightlife in Springvale.
- Better outlook for shopping center: Some individuals expressed the need for improving the appearance of the Springvale shopping center, making it more special and appealing.
- Kids playground: The need for kids' playgrounds or spaces for children to play was mentioned by multiple respondents.
- Public square: People suggested the creation of a central public square that serves as a hub for commercial, civic, and cultural activities in Springvale.
- Better parking: Requests were made for additional parking spaces, including underground parking, as well as closer parking to the shops.
- Public spaces for exercise and sports: There were calls for public sports spaces, bike paths, and exercise areas that are accessible and free for the community.
- Community facilities for youth: Some respondents highlighted the need for a dedicated youth club and access to youth services within Springvale, instead of having to travel to Dandenong.
- More trees and gardens: The addition of trees, gardens, and green spaces throughout Springvale was mentioned as a way to enhance the environment.
- Information center and maps: People expressed the desire for an information center and maps to improve accessibility and provide guidance to visitors.
- Homeless support and services: Several respondents mentioned the need for homeless shelters, support services, and facilities like safe injection sites.

- Cultural and elegant dining options: Individuals wished for more elegant and quality dining establishments and cultural spaces.

- Art spaces and teen event venues: Some respondents felt the lack of art spaces and venues to hold events for teenagers, such as speed cubing, robotics competitions, and art exhibits.
- Health and well-being services: The need for health and well-being service providers was highlighted.
- Public restrooms: Additional public toilets and 24/7 access to restrooms were requested by some individuals.
- Community gathering areas: The desire for public spaces for gathering, talking with friends, and community interaction was mentioned.
- Pedestrian-friendly infrastructure: There were calls for improved pedestrian routes at night, better street lighting, and central pedestrian plazas.
- Family-friendly spaces: People suggested the inclusion of spaces for kids' activities and places where family members can hang out while others are shopping.
- Street parking and bike paths: Requests were made for more street parking options and bike paths connecting main streets.
- Outdoor seating and dining: The addition of outdoor seating areas, pleasant terraces, and dining spaces with greenery and shade was mentioned.


# What could strengthen Springvale's identity?

- Take action instead of making empty promises: Many respondents emphasized the need for local councilors to actively address issues and take concrete actions instead of merely talking about them.
- Embrace and celebrate diversity: Springvale's identity as a culturally diverse suburb should be promoted and celebrated. Suggestions include naming public spaces after notable community members, using traditional Vietnamese or Chinese naming conventions, and displaying public art

- that represents the diverse cultures.
- Improve cleanliness and safety: Respondents emphasized the importance of cleaning up the streets, addressing the issue of homelessness, and ensuring safety in the area. Enhancing cleanliness and security measures were seen as crucial for strengthening Springvale's identity.
- Enhance local businesses and attractions: Suggestions included promoting local stores, improving and expanding the variety of shops and stores, highlighting Springvale's authentic Asian food scene, creating vibrant night activities and restaurants, and attracting more well-known stores.
- Develop community spaces and infrastructure: Creating community spaces like parks, public art installations, and community gardens was suggested to foster a sense of place and community identity. Additionally, improving infrastructure, such as establishing a big gate on Springvale Road and enhancing car parking facilities, was mentioned.
- Preserve and promote local heritage: Preserving historical landmarks, celebrating local festivals and traditions, and supporting local artists and creatives were seen as ways to reinforce Springvale's identity and heritage.
- Enhance communication and engagement: Suggestions included better communication with residents through newsletters or accessible channels, providing information about local events and updates, and involving locals in designing initiatives and activities.
- Improve accessibility and amenities: Respondents mentioned the need for better public transport access, improved lighting, easy parking, and more clean public toilets. Increasing accessibility and amenities were seen as essential for strengthening Springvale's identity.
- Focus on cleanliness and environmental sustainability: Several respondents emphasized the importance of cleanliness, tree planting, and beautification efforts to create an inviting and vibrant environment. Encouraging sustainable practices and promoting environmental initiatives were also suggested.
- Promote Springvale as a tourist destination: Suggestions included promoting Springvale as a must-visit destination for international tourists, developing a tourist promotion program, and creating a website to provide information for visitors.

## 2.5 Big Ideas

#### **Summary**

The community in Springvale has shared several ideas and suggestions for improvement. Here is a summary of their responses:

- Cleaner toilets: The public toilets in Springvale, especially at train stations and shopping centers, need better cleaning and maintenance. The frequency of cleaning should be increased to ensure cleanliness.
- Bike path integration: There is a suggestion to create a bike path along the main roads in Springvale to connect with the Djerring Trail, promoting cycling and active transportation.
- Better management of bins: The community feels that the management of bins needs improvement to prevent overflowing and maintain cleanliness in public spaces.

- Multilingual signage: The community suggests incorporating commonly used languages in Springvale, such as Vietnamese, Chinese (Cantonese and Mandarin), and Khmer, on public signage and wayfinding to cater to the linguistically diverse population.
- Play center for kids: There is a desire for a dedicated indoor or outdoor play center for children in Springvale to provide entertainment and activities.
- Improved hygiene and cleanliness: Suggestions include more public toilets/bathrooms, cleaner shopping environments, and better management of parking areas to ensure cleanliness and accessibility.
- Street improvements: Several suggestions are made regarding road and street improvements, including paving Buckingham Avenue, updating the footpaths, and installing gates for easier road closures during events.
- Cultural diversity in naming: It is proposed to incorporate
  the linguistic and cultural diversity of Springvale in place
  names, considering names from Southeast Asia and East
  Asia that reflect the community's background.
- Additional seating capacity: The community suggests increasing the seating capacity in the area to accommodate more people, especially during events and busy periods.
- Addressing social issues: Concerns are raised about the presence of junkies, beggars, and anti-social behavior in Springvale, emphasizing the need for stricter enforcement, education, and cleaning initiatives.
